


- Were you surprised as you read either the "traditional" or "non-traditional" prayer at any insights that struck you?
- Could you imagine making either one part of your daily spiritual practice?

Bible Study—Lectionary for this coming Sunday—a Model for Lectio Divina in Bible Study

Read * Reflect * Respond * Rest

- 1. **Read.** Participants use different translations of the Bible and take turns reading lines from a particular scripture passage.
- 2. **Reflect.** After everyone has had a chance to finish—allow some silence so that participants can reflect on the meaning of the text for him/her.
- 3. **Respond**. Bring whatever thoughts you have had during the reflection time to the conversation.
- 4. **Rest.** After a while it will seem like the group has run out of things to say on a particular passage. Just sit with the silence for a while, "resting" in and with the text, then, when it feels right, move onto the next passage.

Reflection Questions to stimulate conversation (general)

- Can you see yourself in this story (Psalm, parable, epistle?)
- What do you think the main point of this writing is?
- After reading & reflecting on the text, did you notice any "aha" moments that you didn't have at first hearing of the text?
- How might the hearing and reflecting on this text change you?
- Is there anything you might do or think differently as a result of this text?
